

# 1950-52 Royal Desserts Stars of Baseball Introduction


In 1950, the Royal Desserts, as a promotion for their pudding and gelatin products, issued a set of greyscale photos of baseball players on the back of their boxes. Several eventual Hall of Famers, as well as lesser stars were included in the set. A banner on the top of the "card" declared that these were "ROYAL DESSERTS STARS OF BASEBALL". The promotion lasted through 1952. The cards featured the player's career highlights and vital statistics. When one of these players was traded or had some notable accomplishment a new version of the card was issued with a different cap logo or updated text. A nice, four-bordered card should measure 2-5/8" x 3-1/4 inches. At some point, bluetinted photos were also issued. In addition, an eight-page comb-bound booklet to store the cards could be purchased for 15¢ and three box fronts from any desserts. In 1952, a "premium" set of sixteen 5" x 7" photos was issued. They contained the words "To A Royal Fan" and a facsimile autograph.



















#### "The Trader Speaks" - December 1976

One of the most popular post-World War II sets is entitled Royal Stars of Baseball and was issued on the back of Royal Gelatine Desserts from 1949 to 1951. The 3 1/2" by 2 1/2" blank back cards were printed in either black and white or blue and white. Many had their texts changed over the three year period plus

some had different team designations due to trades. As you'll note #12 Tommy Henrich is misspelled. With all the changes in the set you'd think they'd have corrected the spelling! The 24 card set is checklisted below. Cards marked \*\* exist with 2 different texts; Cards marked \*\* exist with 2 different team designations and texts; Cards marked \*\*\* exist with 2 different team designations and 3 different texts.

The Royal Stars are valued at approximately \$5.00 to \$8.00 each depending on the player..

First of all, a full-bordered card should be 3-1/4" x 2-5/8", issued from 1950 to 1952. The base set contains 24 cards and 16 variations. There are 3 different Ray Scarborough cards, featuring 3 different teams: Senators, White Sox, and Red Sox. Virgil Trucks is listed with 2 different teams. I really don't understand where The Henrich misspelling came from. See Notes, below.

# Royal Stars Of Baseball

#### Surprising Variations Revealed In Royal Dessert Cards

The Royal Stars of Baseball set is very familiar to non
gum card collectors, and has been checklisted numerous times in the past. The twenty-four, numbered, blank backed cards measuring 2½ x 3½ inches if cut properly. were issued one per box on the back of various Royal Dessert products. What is not generally known is the fact that this issue was available from 1950 thru 1952 and team designations updated. There are four different biographies for some players plus the blue tint with red in 1950 as well as the standard black and white with red. It thus seems togical that there are a potential five dif-ferent sets of this issue or a total of 120 cards. Such does

not seem to be the case, however

Second Biographies Missing
A number of players from the set (Henrich, Gordon,
Appling, Ostrowski and Fernander) either retired or
otherwise left the major leagues after 1950 and no second biographies have ever been discovered for them. Thus, the unanswered question arises as to whether these players were dropped from the subsequent issues or simply reissued as is to keep the set at twenty-four. There also should be updates for Dark, Robinson and

The 1952 updates would also seem to be random as only a few players have them and some of those seem to have had it done twice during the year. When all the dust settles, the known cards in this set stands at 71 (24



in 1950 with the same 24 on the blue tint butterscotch pudding box and 23 total updates).

Nanny Fernandez Toughest Card

The key to the set is #23, Nanny Fernandez, who spent most of his career in the Pacific Coast League. He spent parts of only four seasons in the Major Leagues, the last of which was 1950 when he appeared in 65 games and batted .258. His credentials for inclusion in this set are therefore very suspect. Whether dropped from the set after 1950 by Royal or distained by kids turning the boxes over to check the backs for notable

players, he is clearly the hardest card in the set to find.

Also very tough are the 1952 updates with the italicized print line "Offer good only in continental USA, its territories and possessions" at the end of the biography.

Finally, the lower righthand corner of each card con-tained instructions on a premium offer from Royal Desserts. That set of 16 black and white 5 x 7 photos (F-219-6) contained players available in this set in a larger size.






The 1950 - 1953 Royal Desserts baseball card set consist of 32 cards that measure 2 1/2" x 3 1/2" with an additional 12 cards counting variations. (44 in total). The hand cut cards were issued on the back of Royal Dessert product boxes. Intact boxes are rare and have a higher collectors value. The front of the card features a black and white portrait of the player, a short bio, and a mail in offer for a album to hold the cards. The cards are numbered on the front, as the back is blank.

#### VAR - Variation:

This checklist has quite a few errors. The years of issue and the card size are the most obvious. Many variations are left out. The checklist mentions 12 variations instead of 24. The Virgil Trucks (with the St. Louis Browns) is included. It seems strange that the Musial variations are in the checklist, but other, obvious ones like Reese, Kell, DiMaggio, and Spahn are not.

#### "SCD Standard Catalog of Vintage Baseball Cards" - 2016




This set was issued one per box on the backs of various Royal Dessert products over a period of three years. The basic set contains 24 players, however a number of varia-tions create the much higher total for the set. In 1950, Royal issued cards with two different tints - black and white with red, or blue and white with red. Over the next two years, various sentences of the cards' biographies were updated; up to three times in some cases. Some players from the set left the majors after 1950 and others were apparently never updated, but the 23 biography updates that do exist, added to the original 24 cards issued in 1950, give the set a total of 47 cards. The 2-5/8' x 3-1/4" cards are blank-backed with personal and playing biographies alongside the card front photos. Some sample cards can be found with advertising for the desserts on back; they are valued at about double regular card prices. A comb-bound album with seven pages to hold 14 cards was also issued in a 3-1/4" x 3-3/8" format with "Royal Stars" and a crown logo printed in red on white.

This checklist is also quite comprehensive. It contains the 24 base cards, plus 24 variations and 2 Ad Cards. It's missing The Rojek and Sisler (Cardinals) cards and the Seminick Ad Card. It erroneously contains the Scarborough 2nd White Sox card and the Ostrowski White Sox card . Team designations for some cards are missing. See Notes, below.

As a baseball card collector, these cards have always fascinated me: 24 different players from Stan Musial - 3,026 games to Joe Ostrowski - 216 games. All MLB teams are represented except the lowly Browns. In 2006, I decided to start a collection. I concentrated on getting as many of the different players as I could and soon learned that some players had more than one card issued for them. Additional cards were produced when a player was traded or was involved in a significant event during the season like Thomson's home run in the 1951 playoffs with the Dodgers.

If you have a collector's mentality, you're going to need a checklist to keep track of what you have and what you need. Finding an accurate checklist for these cards posed a problem. The 24 cards issued in 1950 were obvious. The variations on these cards were a lot harder to pin down. The existing checklists weren't much help. I've seen checklists with issue dates of 1949 through 1953. How many variations are there? I concluded that there isn't a correct checklist in publication – either in print or on the internet.

I scoured the internet for images of all the Royal Stars of Baseball I could find. As I built my checklist, I posted the images I had to baseball card forums and shared them with other collectors of the set. I was surprised to find out there were many cards that I never knew existed. The results of my efforts are what you see below. Twenty-four base cards, twenty-four variations, three advertisement cards, and one "error" card, for a total of 52. Three "phantom" cards appear on some checklists. Ostrowski with the White Sox, Trucks with the Browns, and a second Scarborough card with the White Sox. I have not included them in my checklist. # 1950-52 Royal Desserts Stars of Baseball Conclusions

Every **Royal Desserts Stars of Baseball** checklist I've ever seen, either in hard copy or on the internet, is either missing something or has added something that cannot be verified. I started this project to rectify the situation. I'm currently at 52 cards.

- 24 base cards with confirmed images. (1950 issue).
- 24 variation cards with confirmed images. (1950-52 issues).
- 3 cards with advertising backs: Reese, Kell, and Seminick.
- 1 "error" card: Brissie "Formerly with the Phillies".
- 25 "Blue Tint" cards are known to exist. (see checklist ).

I'm not including three "phantom" cards that have appeared in various published checklists: a 2<sup>nd</sup> Scarborough card with the White Sox, Ostrowski with the White Sox, and Trucks with the Browns. **As far as I know, none of these three cards has ever been seen in the collecting hobby.** 

Ray Scarborough: appeared in 34 games for the Senators in 1949. After only 8 games in 1950, he was traded to the White Sox. He appeared in 27 games for the White Sox in 1950. He signed with the Red Sox on 12/10/50. He was with the White Sox for only 7 months in 1950. It seems very unlikely that 2 different cards would have been issued for him with the White Sox. My conclusion is that Ray had 2 cards issued in 1950: Senators and White Sox, and his card with the Red Sox was issued in 1951. I'm not including a 2<sup>nd</sup> White Sox card in my checklist.

Johnny Ostrowski: his 1<sup>st</sup> card is listed in some checklists as being with the White Sox. He played there in 1949, and in only one game at the start of 1950. He was traded to the Senators on 5/31/50. If a card was originally issued with the White Sox; possibly it was updated to the Senators early in production, resulting in extremely limited distribution. However, early checklists for Ostrowski mention only one card. I am not including a White Sox card in my checklist.

**Virgil Trucks:** is there a 4<sup>th</sup> card with the Browns? Some early checklists mention this. He was traded from the Tigers to the Browns on 12/4/52. If there is a fourth Trucks card, as a member of the Browns, it would have been issued in 1953. As far as I know, this is a 1950-52 set. I am not including this card in my checklist.

**Lou Brissie:** lost 19 games for the Athletics in 1950. He started only 2 games for them in 1951. He was then traded to the Indians on 4/30/51. The **"Formerly with the Phillies..."** error card

- Rookie of the Year: In the inaugural year of the Rookie of the Year award, Alvin Dark of the Boston Braves (now Atlanta Braves) won the honor in the National League. In the American League, the award went to Chicago White Sox's Walt Dropo.
- World Series: The 1950 World Series saw the New York Yankees facing off against the Philadelphia Phillies. The Yankees proved their dominance, defeating the Phillies in a four-game sweep. Joe DiMaggio and Yogi Berra played crucial roles in leading the Yankees to their 13th World Series title.
- Historical Moment: On June 3, 1950, the Cleveland Indians executed the first-ever major league triple play without recording a single putout. The unique triple play occurred in a game against the Chicago White Sox.
- Integration of African American Players: The 1950 season marked the continued integration of African American players into Major League Baseball. Players like Jackie Robinson and Roy Campanella of the Brooklyn Dodgers and Larry Doby of the Cleveland Indians made significant contributions to their respective teams and helped break barriers in the sport.

#### 1950-52 Royal Desserts Stars of Baseball - The Players





"Stan The Man" won the NL batting title in 1950, '51 and '52. He hit over .300 in 18 of his 22-year career. Stan was an All-Star for every year but his first in the NL. He won the NL MVP Award 3 times. To HOF (BBWAA) in 1969.



2 - Reese - Dodgers SS

Pee Wee's nickname came from shooting marbles as a kid. He was an institution at SS for the Dodgers for 16 years. An All-star for ten of those years. In 1947, he was the first Dodger to befriend Jackie Robinson. HOF (Vet's Comm.) in 1984.



3 - Kell - Tigers 3B

Led the AL with 218 hits in 1950 and 191 hits in 1951. George was a lifetime .306 hitter. He was on the AL All-Star team in 10 of his 15 years in MLB. Elected to the HOF by the Veteran's Committee in 1983. A Tiger's broadcaster for 37 seasons.




4 – DiMaggio – Red Sox CF

"The little Professor" was a fixture in center field for the Red Sox for 11 years. He led the league in runs, triples, and stolen bases in 1950. He was an AL All-Star from 1949 to 1952, and garnered MVP votes from 1948 to 1951.



5 - Spahn - Braves LSP

Warren fought in The Battle Of The bulge in WWII. He didn't win his first ML game until age 25. Warren had the most wins in the 50s: 202. He led the NL in strikeouts in 1949 thru 1952. Lifetime record: 363-245. Elected to HOF (BBWAA) in 1973.



6 – Pafko – Cubs → Dodgers LF


Nickname: "Handy Andy" or "Pruschka". Andy had a career year in 1950: hit .304 with 36 HRs and a .397 OBP. Hit 3 homers in a game: 8/2/50. Playing for the Braves, he lost the starting RF job to a Young Hank Aaron in 1955.




Andy was an NL All-Star in 1949. Hit .288 with 24 HRs in 1950; OBP .400. Garnered 14 MVP votes. His teammates called him "The Mad Russian". He was a rock solid catcher and enjoyed a 15-year MLB career with the Phillies and Reds.



8 - Brissie - A's → Indians LRP

Pitched with a brace on left leg. Had it shattered in 30 pieces by 117mm shell, fighting in Italy, during WWII. Doctors wanted to amputate, but Lou wouldn't let them. He pitched for 7 years with the A's and Indians. Lifetime: 44-48.




9 - Blackwell - Reds RSP

Known as "The Whip" for his buggy whip side-arm delivery. Ewell had a wild time in 1950: Won 17, lost 15, with 188 SO, 112 BB. He led the NL with 13 hit batters and 11 WPs. He was an NL All-Star in 1951-52. Picked up MVP votes in both years.



10 - Thomson - Giants 3B / CF

Known as "The Staten Island Scot". Switched from CF to 3B, 7/20/51. Hit .237 in CF, .357 at 3B. Hit "The Shot Heard 'Round The World" on 10/3/51. Bobby was an NL All-Star in 1952 and received MVP votes in 1951 and 1952.



11 - Rizzuto - Yankees SS

"The Scooter" won the AL MVP in 1950. Led AL shortstops in fielding. Hit .324, scored 125 runs; had a .418 OBP. He was elected to the HOF, by the Veteran's Committee in 1994. With his time as a broadcaster, he had a 53-year Yankee career.



12 - Henrich - Yankees 1B

"Catching a baseball is a pleasure. Knowing what to do with it after you catch it is a business". Tommy was known as "The Clutch or "Old Reliable" for his timely hitting. 1950 was Tommy's last year as a Yankee's player. Yankee coach in 1951.

13 - Gordon - Indians 2B

"Flash" ended his playing career in 1950 as the Indians 2<sup>nd</sup> baseman. A perennial All-star, he also received MVP votes in 8 of his 11 years in MLB. He was elected to the HOF, by the Veteran's Committee in 2009.




14 – Scarborough – Senators → White Sox
→ Red Sox RSP

Named an AL All-Star in 1950, but did not appear in the game. Had an unremarkable 80-85 record over 10 MLB seasons. Once called "the pitching pickle peddler" by the Boston press because of his off-season job as a pickle salesman.




15 – Rojek – Pirates → Cardinals → Browns SS

Nickname: "Happy Rabbit", because of his projecting front teeth. Parttime SS for the Pirates, Cardinals and Browns. Stan was never the same offensive player after a beaning by Ken Johnson of the Cardinals in 1949.



16 - Appling - White Sox SS

1950 (age 43) was the last of a 20-year career for "Old Aches and Pains", a lifetime .310 hitter. At the time of his retirement, Luke held the AL record for most games played at SS. He was elected to the HOF by the BBWAA in 1964.



17 - Marshall - Braves RF

Willard was an NL All-Star in 1949. Played all three outfield positions in 1950. Played exclusively in RF in 1951. Handled 231 chances without an error. Willard had an excellent arm from the outfield; he had 125 lifetime assists in 11 years



18 - Dark - Giants SS

Nicknames: "Blackie" or "The Swamp Fox". ML ROY in 1948. Led NL short-stops in DPs in 1951. Led the NL with 41 doubles in 1951. Hit .417 in the 1951 WS. A 3-time NL All-Star at SS: 1951, 1952, 1953. Received MVP votes in '51 and '52.

19 – Sisler – Phillies → Reds → Cardinals LF

Son of HOFer George Sisler. Put the Phillies in the 1950 WS, with a 10<sup>th</sup> inning HR on the last day of the season. Dick's exploits in the 1950 pennant race were immortalized by Ernest Hemingway in his book "The Old Man And The Sea".




20 - Ostrowski - Senators LF

Johnny was primarily a left fielder. He had a completely undistinguished 7-year career with 4 different AL teams. Why he was included in this set remains a mystery. Where's Eddie Yost or Mickey Vernon?




21 - Trucks - Tigers RSP

"Fire" Trucks had a 5-19 record in 1952, but two of his wins were nohitters. He is among only 6 ML pitchers to do so. Virgil had a 17-year career with 5 different AL teams. Lifetime record: 177-135.




22- Robinson - White Sox 1B

23 - Fernandez - Pirates 3B



24 - Fain - Athletics 1B



As with the checklists, the published values for these cards are out of date. This is my attempt to bring some order to the chaos. It's just a straight-line list of values from **good** to **mint**. Raw, base set cards listed on eBay are mostly in poor condition. They usually sell for between \$30 and \$50. HOFers are more expensive with Musial leading the way. Cards other than the base set are hardly ever seen. Scarce variations sell in the \$300 to \$500 range. Graded cards usually sell for more than their raw counterparts. Cards in near mint or higher condition are hardly ever seen in the marketplace. The above prices do not take into account the scarcity of any particular card.

In order to get an idea of the relative "rarity" of each of the 51 cards in the set, I examined three things on 5/10/2023: the cards listed on eBay and the Population Reports of both PSA and SGC. The 637 cards I looked at are distributed as above. On the next page I have assigned a rarity factor to each card based on this distribution., with 1 being the most common and 6 being the rarest.



**Thoughts on card rarity:** the 24 base cards issued in 1950, are quite easy to find, with the exception of Gordon, Fernandez, Trucks and Scarborough with the Senators. The thirteen 1951 issues are more difficult to acquire. The 1952 issues are quite difficult to obtain. They are rarely seen in the marketplace. Most of the cards seen on eBay, are badly cut, creased, or soiled. Clean, four-bordered cards from any year are seldom seen. In the above table, a factor of 1 equals the most common cards and 6 equals the rarest.



If you use a card's Grade, the Suggested Values from page 20, and the Rarity Factors from page 22, you can estimate a value for your cards. I got the Rarity Factor idea from a ChatGPT query. This is a sort of a semi-scientific method that matches up pretty well with asking prices in the marketplace. The PSA 7 Phil Rizzuto, below, with a 1 Rarity Factor would be worth \$350.00. It sold on eBay for \$293.



#### **1952 Royal Desserts Premiums**

In 1952 the Royal Desserts Company issued a series of 16 black and white action photos on thin paper. The unnumbered photos include a facsimile autograph along with the notation, "To a Royal Fan." Eight players from the original package backs were not included: Henrich, Gordon, Rojek, Appling, Marshall, Ostrowski, Trucks, and Fernandez. Five players are pictured with new teams: Brissie (Indians), Pafko (Dodgers), Scarborough (Red Sox), Seminick, and Sisler (Reds). The Musial is by far the most valuable. In a 7/30/23 eBay auction, a nice one sold for slightly over \$350. Spahn, Reese, Rizzuto, Kell, and DiMaggio are next most valuable. I have not been able to determine how these photos were distributed.



#### **1950 Royal Desserts Extras**



In 1950, Royal Desserts offered an album for their various card sets. It was a comb-bound booklet that could store 16 cards in celluloid pages. It measured 3-1/8" by 3-1/8". These can be found on eBay from time to time and are moderately priced.



Another Royal bonus for baseball fans was this 32-page magazine titled "Royal Book of Baseball Facts - 1950 Edition". It is full of interesting facts and statistics from 1949, and was allegedly edited by Stan Musial. Some of the topics included in the book are: 1949 Major League Standings, 1949 Batting and Pitching Records, and a listing of Hall of Fame members as of 1949. These are quite scarce, in nice shape, and are valued at more than \$100.

#### 1950 Royal Musial Clean-Up Club

Stan Musial was the face of the 1950 Royal Desserts Stars of Baseball offering. He was one of the most prominent stars in baseball and was pictured on the No. 1 card - the most valuable card in the set. It's not surprising that Royal used his image to sell their products to kids. Royal instituted the Stan Musial Clean-Up Club, which encouraged kids to "clean up their plates" at breakfast, lunch, and dinner then they could enjoy a Royal dessert. A Clean-Up Chart was given out at the grocery store when you bought 3 packages of Royal gelatin desserts. After one week of clean plates, the chart could be sent in for 3 free gifts: a St. Louis Cardinals' emblem, a Clean-Up Club pin, and a signed 5 x 7 picture of Stan Musial. A letter form Stan would accompany the free gifts. (see next page). The ad at the right comes form a 1950 newspaper. I remember seeing cards on the backs of Royal packages in the 50s, but never knew that this promotion was being offered.


